

Studying abroad with a child

Guideline for University of Bonn students



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1. Introduction



Going abroad as a student – to do a language course, an internship or spend a semester at a partner university – is a great experience not many would want to miss. The opportunity to live in a different country, improve your foreign language skills and get to know a new culture motivates many

students to leave their comfort zone and home country and move to a foreign country temporarily. These guidelines aim to make it easier for students with a child to go abroad. The Office of Family Services and the International Office provide University of Bonn students with individual and thorough advice.

It is only natural that young parents have their doubts with regard to spending time abroad with a child as it is already a complex endeavor if no child is involved: The apartment in Germany needs to be sublet, a place to stay abroad needs to be found, a task which in itself – depending on the city – may be quite nerve-wracking. At the same time you need to settle into the university and get used to the country, its language and people.

Organizing childcare or finding a school for your child and mastering the balancing act between study-related and family responsibilities whilst studying abroad are, without any doubt, additional challenges on top of everything else. According to reports from people who have studied abroad with a child, it is well possible, but preparation beforehand is key. Their reports and stories inspire and may be helpful when starting to think about studying abroad with a child.

2. Prior to the stay abroad

2.1 General

There are different ways for students with a child to go about studying abroad: Students may decide to travel to and stay in the host country on their own while family members take care of their child back home. Some students, however, decide to go abroad as a family and for the child to

attend school or a day-care center. There is definitely no one-fits-all solution; each family needs to decide what is best given the circumstances.

2.2 Funding

Life with a child is usually more expensive, the same goes for when staying abroad: A bigger apartment is needed and day care usually involves a fee. The fee varies from country to country and, in a few instances, may be waived altogether. As family policy and day care costs could be crucial factors in choosing a host country, thorough research beforehand is recommended.

It may be helpful to consider the following points in your calculation of costs and decision-making process:

- Accommodation
- Meals

- Health insurance
- Day care/school
- Leisure activities etc.

The following funding options are available to you:

International BAföG

Those who receive only a low level of BAföG funding in Germany should still apply for international BAföG. While the amount depends on the target country, it usually pays more. In some cases a student in Germany may receive less than €50 but over €300 when staying in France. Both domestic and international BAföG pay a childcare supplement which amounts to €160 per child a month in winter semester 2022/2023.

Erasmus supplement



The Erasmus+ Programme pays a supplement to students with children which could be used for accommodation or child care costs, amongst other things. In addition to the usual country-dependent mobility grant, single parents and couples with children receive an extra €250 per month to facilitate participation in the Erasmus Pro-

gramme which must be applied for prior to commencing the stay abroad. If both parents go abroad together and receive Erasmus Programme funding, only one parent is entitled to the supplement. The supplement is also available to interns with a child.

Scholarships

Students can also apply for a scholarship to obtain funding. Every year in spring you can apply for the <u>Deutschlandstipendium</u> at the University of Bonn. The scholarship holders regularly receive a monthly sum of €300 for the duration of one year – also abroad. If you are a student with good to very good grades, we recommend to consider applying.

Each year, MAWISTA health insurance grants a <u>one-off payment of €3,000</u> to students with a child.

Whether you are able to apply for multiple scholarships depends on the terms of each scholarship.

Foundations

There are scholarships aimed specifically at students with a child, such as offered by

- Stiftung Christiane Nüsslein-Volhard and
- Klaus Tschira Stiftung.

Parental benefit

Although residence in Germany is a precondition for the payment of parental benefit, if you are able to demonstrate to the "Familienkasse" of the Employment Agency that your presence in a country outside Germany is only temporary and serves training purposes, its payment could be continued. To this end, you need to contact the "Familienkasse" of the Employment Agency as early as possible.

Family allowance

Although residence in Germany is a precondition for the payment of family allowance, if you are able to demonstrate that you have not sublet your accommodation (i.e. it remains available to your family at all times) you may be able to remain in receipt of family allowance.

Individual funding from the University of Bonn

The University of Bonn supports students going abroad with a child with a monthly payment of €100. For each sibling coming along, funding is increased by €50 per month.

Local funding options

Do your research about local funding options early on. Some countries may offer funding similar to the German accommodation benefit that you could apply for.

3. During and after the stay abroad

There are contact persons available locally during your stay abroad. Many cities and universities abroad also have an Office of Family Services or similar service desk. We recommend you do your research and contact these offices before you travel abroad.

To the extent possible, both the Office of Family Services and the International Office in Bonn also support you during your stay abroad.

To improve our support for students with a child and remove any barriers for going abroad, the Office of Family Services will ask you to answer a few questions upon your return to the University of Bonn.
